#### **INVEST IN OUR STUDENTS – Eliminate Reduced-Price** School Meals

· Eliminating reduced-price meals, like providing bus transportation and internet access, helps level the playing field for all students

• Eliminating reduced-price meals will work to minimize school lunch debt and end the practice of "lunch shaming"

• Eliminating reduced-price meals is the right thing to do for hard-working Wisconsin families. A family of 3 with both parents working full-time making \$7.25/hr would now gualify for free school meals under the budget plan.

### **INVEST IN FARM TO SCHOOL GRANTS**

- · Farm to school programs help strengthen local economies by expanding markets for Wisconsin agricultural products.
- · Farm to School programs provide all kids access to nutritious, high quality local foods
- Farm to School programs help promote children's health by providing fresh foods, supports the development of healthy eating habits and increases students understanding of agriculture, food, nutrition and the environment.

### FULLY FUND THE SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

- · Ensuring kids start the school day ready to learn is a critical step on the path out of poverty
- · Providing school breakfast works most schools provide breakfast on test day. We should provide breakfast all school year so students can learn the subject prior test day.
- · Providing school breakfast helps children have improved attendance and academic achievement as well as decreases tardiness.
